

Padre's Corner

July 2, 2017 Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In "Padres Corner" last week I was referencing changes that have impacted the Catholic community over the last five decades. Population shifts also affect parishes, usually due to ethnic group shifting that could make a once vibrant church virtually lifeless. Many of the Manhattan parishes, once vivid receptors of the incoming immigrant base, have been reduced to spiritual rubble as a result of these serious shifts. This is why many have been or will be closed. Georgetown University "Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate" indicates only 22% of American Catholics attend weekly Mass, and a 2010 "Pew Research" survey painted the fact that 45% of American Catholics believe the Eucharist is a symbol rather than the Real Presence of Jesus Christ. There are also the property tax factors when many must leave, say New York, for cheaper states such as Florida or the Carolina's, and downsizing when younger generations seeking work must migrate within the country to other regions where employment is more plentiful. When I travel through Upstate New York these transformations are very obvious, resulting in a decimation of church social and sacramental life. Saint Gerard Majella in Hollis, Queens where I was a young boy and Saint Joseph's in Bogota, New Jersey shortly later are not the Irish/Italian conclaves they once were.

Internationally, the reasons for parish numerical drops could be for far grimmer reasons. I remember well a Maryknoll mission trip to Guatemala and El Salvador in January, 2013 when courageous sisters and priests spoke of the mortal risks they faced trying to save their parishioners from oppressive political groups. Many of their peer group, such as Archbishop Oscar Romero, were jailed or assassinated. I visited the bedroom of Romero in San Salvador, where he was shot dead in 1980 on March 24 while saying a Mass, and can still vividly recall his blood-stained cassock. There were also the graves nearby of religious sisters massacred near an airport.

The Middle East has seen a dramatic drop in Christian presence, because of both a search for better opportunities and the threats of terrorism against Christianity by other "faith" groups. Studies from the "Center for the Study of Global Christianity", out of Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary in Massachusetts, indicate the Christian population from 2010-2025 will decline from 4.2% to 3% which is a significant loss. Journalist Maria Abi-Habib wrote, "The exodus leaves the Middle East overwhelmingly dominated by Islam, whose rival sects often clash, raising the prospect that radicalism in the region will deepen. Conflicts between Sunni and Shiite Muslims have erupted across the Middle East, squeezing out Christians in places such as Iraq and Syria and forcing them to carve out new lives abroad, in Europe, the U.S., and elsewhere." Declining birth rates, especially among the native generations in Europe, are also seriously impacting parishes. As non-Christian groups increasingly grow numerically in Europe, there is a far less need for parish churches.

The low birth-rate mentality also exists in America, further adding to the vocational numbers crisis for both sisters and priests. In the 1960's large families prevailed in my New Jersey hometown: the Gallagher family with eight and the Fitzgerald with ten as examples. So where do we turn for optimism and inspiration? How about the coinage in the United States "In God We Trust?" This spiritual phrase was added to our monetary system by Congress during the Civil War on April 22, 1864. This addition was prompted in an 1861 letter by the Reverend M. R. Watkinson, of Pennsylvania, to Treasury Secretary Salmon P. Chase reflecting the power of the individual to advance positive change in society be it the United States or elsewhere. Chase, of Ohio, wrote in 1861 to the director of the U.S. Mint: "No nation can be strong except in the strength of God, or safe except in His defense. The trust of our people in God should be declared on our national coins." Great advice for Newburgh160 years later, on this Independence Day weekend, amidst dramatic changes for parishes. God bless us.
