Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Winston Churchill of England wrote about courage during the agonies of World War II: "Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts." Eleanor Roosevelt, wife of Franklin the American president during the same war, reflected: "You gain strength, courage, and confidence by every experience in which you really stop to look fear in the face. You are able to say to yourself: I lived through this horror. I can take the next thing that comes along." Later president John F. Kennedy wrote a book called "Profiles In Courage," that penned his experiences as a military officer during World War II plus other past historical patriots. Winning the "Pulitzer Prize," the theme of human grace under pressure can be universally applied for all times and ages. I truly believe that we live in such social times that require similar individual and collective courage, as we watch our sacred institutions of Church and even the noble name of the Presidency mocked and vilified. We can draw inspiration from past figures, and then can find that type of soul in current times to continue to inspire forward. Over the next few weeks in "Padres Corner," and then on occasion, I will research and report to you these human lightning rods of faith.

Clemens August Graf Von Galen was the Bishop of Munster, Germany during World War II. The fears then of international tensions mark the same world we live in during 2017. The Third Reich program of social cleansing by the Nazi's was designed to euthanize "lives unworthy of life." Referred to as the "Lion of Munster", Bishop Von Galen opposed from the pulpit such crimes against humanity. These crimes extended into the concentration camps beyond the public hospitals, as even Jewish babies would be purposely drowned by medical nurses and doctors in order to stunt their population growth. Von Galen publicly condemned these actions, even naming Adolph Hitler from the pulpit. Born into a family of wealth at Dinklage Castle on March 16 of 1878, he was Jesuit educated at the Stella Matutina School in Austria bordered by Switzerland. Ordained in 1904, he served in various parishes from 1906 through 1929 in Berlin. He encouraged parishioners during that time which included World War I to develop food pantries, aid societies, and clothing drives. In 1929, he was made pastor of Saint Lambert's Church in Munster. **Four years later** in 1933, he was elevated to the Bishop ranks in the same city with the motto "neither by flattery or fear." He would eventually lead public efforts against the Nazi extermination of the senile, mentally ill and handicapped, crippled, epileptics, and children with Down's Syndrome though the list of "undesirables" would quickly expand.

The Gestapo expanded their anti-religious hatred by 1941 with the confiscation of Church properties, turning them into brothels and movie theaters of propaganda. Monasteries were suppressed, and religious orders of sisters and priests expelled. On August 3, 1941 the future Cardinal and Saint roared outward in a courageous homily: "Innocent Germans were being murdered, because in the judgment of some official body, on the decision of some committee, they have become unworthy to live, because they are classed as unproductive members of the national community... Poor human beings, ill human beings, they are unproductive, if you will. But does that mean that they have lost the right to live? Have you, have I, the right to live only so long as we are productive?"

Von Galen would soon be placed in house arrest until the end of the war in 1945. Hans Oster, a Lutheran, commented about him: "He's a man of courage and conviction. And what resolution in his sermons. There should be a handful of such people in all our churches... If there were, Germany would look quite different." Becoming a Cardinal on February 21, 1946 Von Galen died one month later on **March 22** of an appendix infection. He is buried in the Cathedral of Munster. He was beatified by Pope Benedict XVI on October 9, 2005 outside of Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome. I pray, as a priest and pastor, to have the same courage and conviction to speak out against euthanasia and abortion. How about you?
