

April, 29, 2018 Fifth Sunday of Easter

Southwestern Germany, the state of Baden-Wurttemberg, is famous for the Black Forest containing spectacular scenery in Western Europe. On the Alpine journey last December, my travel group stayed there on a snowy night at an inn that looked like a Swiss Chalet. A huge outdoor cuckoo clock on its grounds welcomed us each hour with the cuckoo bird and a couple greeting each other for a dance. While there our group was given a tour of a cuckoo shop, with brief explanations of its mechanics and origins. The clocks come in many sizes with numerous themes, going way beyond the standard bird bellowing out its hourly cuckoo chorus. The colors and story lines of life could be found in these individual handmade pieces. What struck me was how fragile the clocks are, despite their beauty and simplicity. Warranties were only for two years. Could that be an appropriate analogy to the life of each person: beautifully crafted by the creative hand of God yet made fragile by the stresses and futilities that often strike.

There is no official founder of the cuckoo clock, but what is known is that its mechanical origins apparently arose out of the Black Forest in the middle 1700's. That type of dating puts its invention around the time of the establishment of the United States in 1776. Sales of the clock were found throughout the Christmas Market destinations of Germany, Austria, and Switzerland.

The 1850's have been identified as the period of time when the popularization of exporting cuckoo clocks around the world began. Inside of the clock the use of electromagnets and weights prompt the call of the bird, though we learned on the tour that breakdowns requiring maintenance are frequent. I saw keenly the analogy to the human body, beautifully made but broken down by sickness and the emotional challenges of life. Though historians make tentative claims that rudimentary cuckoo clocks may have been discovered by the nobleman Philipp Hainhofer (1578-1647) in Augsburg, Germany and further enhanced in subsequent decades, the novelty and mass development cannot be pinpointed until one century later in the Black Forest region of Germany.

Amazingly a Catholic priest by the name of Father Markus Fidelis Jack was able to identify such clock origins in the Black Forest, in an 1810 book he wrote called "Descriptions of the Industry and the Traffic of the Black Forest." He reported: "the cuckoo clock was invented in 1730 by a clock-master Franz Anton Ketterer from Schonwald (word meaning beautiful or Black Forest). This craftsman adorned a clock with a moving bird that announced the hour with the cuckoo-call. The clock-master got the idea of how to make the cuckoo-call from the bellows of a church organ." Though this story has its detractors, it is the accepted version in the Black Forest which is heavily Roman Catholic. The debate reminds me of the divergent stories about the beginning of the game called baseball circa 1839: was it in Cooperstown, New York or Hoboken, New Jersey or elsewhere?

There are critics perhaps wondering what in the name of God does an analysis of cuckoo clocks have to do with our religious life of prayer and sacrament. While understanding those sentiments of query and bewilderment, perhaps I can explain in a coherent and non-cuckoo way. Francis of Assisi, our patron saint for the unified parishes including Sacred Heart, was considered crazy or even cuckoo by many of his contemporaries in 1200's Italy. He chose a religious calling over the wealthy household of merchants he was born into, methodically disrobing from his expensive garments in a public square to the shock and awe of his visual observers. He attracted followers to the Franciscan way by stories of analogy, obviously bizarre to some but quite meaningful to others. Cuckoo clocks would not have been his metaphor to Christ, as they were not invented yet. Such aforementioned clocks represent in my mind the cuckoo, fragile, harsh, discouraging, blessed, holy, wholesome, and cohesive moments of life weakened by our failures and emboldened by our faith. Happy Cuckoo Clock Day! To those critical or not remember me in prayer to the Lord.
