Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Clive Staples (CS) Lewis was born on November 29, 1898 in Belfast, Ireland and died on November 22, 1963 in Oxford, England. He died the exact same day as President John F. Kennedy who was assassinated in Dallas, Texas. Recently I saw a play on the life of Lewis at the Acorn Theater on 42nd Street in Manhattan, entitled "C.S. Lewis Onstage: The Most Reluctant Convert." Actor Max McLean, who I met after the production, was masterful in depicting the transition in life for Lewis from a philosophical position of atheist to Christian. He saw the horrors of World War I in England, which escalated when the United States declared war on Germany come April 6 in 1917.

(As an aside, the Knights of Columbus established recreation huts for the allied troops in Europe as a place of respite and companionship. From "Columbia Magazine," these words of solace also to soldiers from England: "Soldiers needed a respite from the war; they needed Mass and the sacraments. The Knights of Columbus came to the rescue, providing a major service with recreation centers, which became known as huts...No soldier or sailor had to pay a cent for anything the Knights gave them, nor would any free-will offering on their part be accepted by the secretaries who ran the huts. They gave everything free to whomever walked in, with no questions about religion, race or rank. The uniform was all that mattered. In the huts, soldiers had the opportunity to attend Mass, go to confession, hear a music recital, see vaudeville entertainment or watch a movie. They could attend a dance, write letters home... The Knights provided 1,800 tons of stationary, or read a book from the library.") He thought long and hard about the soldiers buried in church cemeteries, encouraging him to closely examine the meaning of life within the scope of human behavior.

Max McLean wrote for the play program: "In 1950, C.S. Lewis received a letter from a young American writer expressing his struggle to believe Christianity because he thought it "too good to be true." Lewis responded, "My own position at the threshold of Christianity was exactly the opposite of yours. You wish it were true; I strongly hoped it was not. Do you think people like Stalin, Hitler... Would be pleased on waking up one morning to find that they were not their own masters... That there was nothing even in the deepest recesses of their thoughts about which they could say to Him, "Keep out! Private. This is my business. "Do you?... There first reaction would be as mine was rage and terror.

"Though baptized in the Anglican Church of Ireland, Lewis drifted away from his faith until he began to look closely at human pain. Wartime radio broadcasts gave order to his essays and reflections on the Christian life producing books such as Mere Christianity, A Grief Observed, The Problem of Pain, The Screwtape Letters, and The Chronicles of Narnia. His mother Flora (1862-1908) was the daughter of an Anglican priest in Ireland. At the age of four, he experienced grief firsthand when his dog Jacksie was killed by a passing car. The death of his mother, health woes, and life disillusionment led to his abandonment of the faith as a teenager, while becoming enchanted by the occult. Serving with the British Army during World War I convinced Lewis there could not be a loving God, with such horror and bloodshed. Author friends such as Yeats, the Catholic Tolkien and later Catholic Chesterton encouraged him back to the faith in the 1920's after the World War was over.

In 1929, Lewis wrote: "I gave in, and admitted that God was God, and knelt and prayed: perhaps, that night, the most dejected and reluctant convert in all England." He would often ask: "How could a good God allow pain to exist in the world?" Before his death, and conversion to the Catholic understanding of the Eucharist as the Real Presence of Christ, Lewis reflected: "I believe in Christianity as I believe that the Sun has risen, not only because I see it but because I see everything else." He is buried in Holy Trinity Church in Oxford, England. Lewis is courageous to me because he overcame many life adversities and intellectual arrogance to find God. This harsh and indifferent world needs his message.
