

Padre's Corner

October 15, 2017 Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Fort Tryon Park in Upper Manhattan places the Cloisters Museum amongst its historical visitor treasures. Founded on May 10, 1938 the establishment is connected to the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Over 5000 pieces of art form its composition, mostly from monasteries and abbeys in France dating from the 12th-15th centuries. One example is the Cuxa part of the Cloisters, once the Benedictine Abbey of Saint Michel abandoned in 1791 on the eve of the violent French Revolution (which resulted in the execution of many, including priests, at the guillotine). In another chapel from Northern Spain are four tombs, from the Bellpuig de las Avellanes Monastery. There are numerous statues of saints, chalices, vestments, tapestries, furniture, stained glasses, altars, and crosses from other once-occupied sacred Catholic settings. What was once alive with priests, nuns, parishioners, sacramental lives, and prayer have now been declassified into show-and-tell museum pieces. While appreciative that the religious history is preserved, something is spiritually missing. The Eucharistic celebrations are no more. There is an empty feeling, while recognizing the absence of what was once an active parish.

Many of the twenty-one California missions, established by Saint Junipero Serra starting in 1769, have the same empty feeling now serving as state museums. When parishes close, such as Saint Mary's in Newburgh, the faithful have that same sense of loss. Population shifts, declining numbers of priests, and declining finances are all legitimate factors behind closing churches even dating back to these medieval times. Walking past a closed church evokes these same sad sentiments. Even baseball stadium "cathedrals" stimulate the tear glands in fans when they are closed and razed, burying with it all the memories and original bricks out of which it was once constructed.

I remembered a great sense of loss when the old Yankee Stadium, built in 1923, was rendered into nothingness a decade ago. The original stadium was where I went to my first Yankees game in 1968, with my late Dad, watching Mickey Mantle in his final season as a baseball player. When the new stadium was opened, I recall the old being draped in a black material that reminded me of a black pall during a funeral burial. The location of the original ballpark, where Babe Ruth once chased fly balls in right field, has some remnants like upper stadium frieze (facade) that remain like the surviving artifacts in a museum. However, minus the crowds things are just not the same.

Andy Rooney (1919-2011) gave a weekly reflection on "60 Minutes," from 1978 to 2011 on CBS. They were commentaries on slices of American life. He once recalled: "I've learned that simple walks with my father around the block on summer nights when I was a child, did wonders for me as an adult... That I wish I could have told my Mom that I love her one more time before she passed away." The passing of the seasons, times of your life, ages, decades, and centuries all possess this painful detachment from what was familiar and loved. The old neighborhoods, stadiums, parish churches, Main Street stores, movie theaters, parks filled once with childhood laughter and baseball swings, and the voices of our loved ones eventually close or go silent in most cases.

(Madonna wrote a heart-throbbing song called "This Used To Be My Playground." One verse echoed: "This used to be my playground. This used to be my childhood dream. This used to be the place I ran to whenever I was in need of a friend. Why did it have to end... because life is short. And before you know you're feeling old, and your heart is breaking. Don't hold onto the past.") There is one constant, however, in the midst of all the change and loss. God remains ever present to us.

In early Christianity, the early house churches from the first through third centuries are gone from the days when the faith could not be legally professed. But, the faith persisted in the hearts and souls of those long gone from centuries ago. The same faith then likewise endured loss, change, grief, sadness, illness, and death. We tap into that river of faith today, drawing upon the spiritual strength of our ancestors in the Catholic tradition.

TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Isaiah 25:6-10a

This passage describes the new Jerusalem as a heavenly banquet on the mountain with the Lord God wiping away all tears.

Second Reading: Philippians 4:12-14, 19-20

In simple, direct words, Paul thanks the Philippians for alleviating his hardships. He stresses, though, that he is as accustomed to poverty as to abundance and finds all his strength in Christ.


