### Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Farragut, Tennessee was the setting on August 21, 2017 for the first total eclipse in America since 1919, spanning large swaths of territory from the Pacific to the Atlantic. Using our two dollar plastic glasses, in a frenzy to find them for eye protection from the intense rays of the sun, all gathered in that serene park knew what the outcome would be. The moon would pass between the earth and the sun at 2:25 pm, and put the sky around us into total darkness. As the scientists had so accurately predicted, the spectacular event took place without any interference from clouds or storms.

There was a sudden cool wind, and an eerie silence that punctuated the previous rapidity of human discourse just moments before. There was shock and awe, that even got the souvenir hawkers to shut their operations for the two minutes and thirty seconds of the eclipse. Then the darkness was replaced by the reemergence of the sun. Light replaced the darkness, almost a perfect Christmas/Easter allegory of what God does in each of our lives. The dark eeriness of sin and death is reversed by the balmy sunshine of a relationship with God. Despair and fatigue are engulfed by the embrace of the Almighty.

There was a "Twilight Zone" episode from fifty-five years ago called "The Eyes of the Beholder", which reflected this theme of the dark-covered eyes gradually freed of the bondage of bandages after a surgery to reveal the light beyond. Images from the movie "The Shack," as a burdened man tries to make spiritual sense of the kidnapped disappearance of his daughter from a campground setting that was supposed to be a place of serenity and rich family memories, is felt. The journey continued from Tennessee to Kentucky, where a Biblical outlook of life (6000 years of God-created human history, in contrast to the billions of years that scientists proclaim based on imperfect human reasoning) was experienced in the companion "Creation Museum" and the "Ark Experience." Human questions in the museum were posed to the visitors: Why am I here? Am I alone? Why do I suffer? Is there any hope? Why do we have to die? 6000 years of human history in relationship to God were vividly painted through the moving words of Noah, before the world was destroyed because of pagan thinking and indifference to the ways of God's teachings.

Movies in a campfire setting allowed modern-day thinkers to question life and death. God offers the answers we need, which the darkened world often cannot. There is a pictorial sequence of a dying father talking to his bewildered daughter. "This isn't the end for me. Where I'm going there is no cancer and no death. More than anything, I want you there with me forever, but you must believe in Jesus. Gabby, don't blame God for this." In another scene, a young lady is in a party besieged with drugs and alcohol plus all other sorts of debauchery. She thinks: "What am I doing here? This isn't working." The Ark model, based on the precise measurements that God dictated to Noah before the massive flood perhaps 5000 years ago, reflects the same themes of mercy and repentance. Roughly 7000 combinations of animals, male and female for future reproduction, join Noah's family of eight. They are mocked by humanity about the divine escape plan, until the rains start to fall heavily. By then it is too late to board the ark. Metaphors for getting God back into our life are clear, before the eclipse of death suddenly strikes and it is too late to make amends.

The Ark is like our divine soul, possessing our memories and inclinations. Walking through this behemoth structure, aside from the tacky souvenir stores, is a reminder of our need for God (these words written in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania in the aftermath of all the above, while a ladybug crawls on my leg). I recall years ago, in 1990, driving to Nebraska with friends to priesthood ordinations for those studying with us at Saint Joseph's Seminary in Yonkers. I set a video recorder for a hockey Stanley Cup game, pitting the Pittsburgh Penguins at the (now Dallas) Minnesota North Stars. Returning a few days later, I hoped to be surprised by the score outcome without any newspaper tip offs or human sports reports. My plan, of course, failed learning that Minnesota (my favorite hockey team) had lost. The Penguins coach was jubilant. Six months later he was dead of cancer. Through God we know the end results already, not having to keep score. Do His will, be sorry for the times we all fail because of human weakness, and embrace those most dear to us with His incredible messages for all ages and centuries of divine mercy and forgiveness. I have spent nearly twenty-five years preaching this message, and trying (often failing) to live it. Like Noah, the same teachings from God then and now. Bless us  
Lord.

**THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

**First Reading:** Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31

An encomium for a good and worthy wife, this passage from Proverbs extols all the virtues which a worthy wife possesses – fidelity, industriousness, skill, charity to the poor, and fear of the Lord.

**Second Reading:** 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6

Once again, Paul reassures the Thessalonians, who are anxious about the coming of Christ, that they need not fear being unprepared because they are “children of light.”

**Gospel:** Matthew 25:14-30

Jesus narrates the parable of the talents – in the story, the silver pieces given to the three men. Two of the men invest their coins and double their worth, but the third buries his coins in the ground and earns no return. The message of Jesus is that we must use to the fullest the talents we have received.
