**December 3, 2017
First Sunday of Advent**

"The life of every man is a diary in which he means to write one story, and writes another; and his humblest hour is when he compares the volume as it is with what he vowed to make it." This inspirational quotation on reality checks was penned by Scottish author J.M. Barrie (1860-1937) in "The Little Minister." Groucho Marx (1890-1977) opined these comedic thoughts on seeking reality: "If you find it hard to laugh at yourself, I would be happy to do it for you... I've had a perfectly wonderful evening, but this wasn't it." We live in times, like always of course, that require a balance of faith and realistic vision with humor and spiritual detachment. God offers us in the context of human events the opportunity to take His plan for us seriously again. When life is too easygoing or devoid of sufferings, we tend to get soft and blurry-eyed about that plan. We may partake of a heaven-on-earth approach, rather than a daily regiment of prayerfulness and taking the role of God seriously in our decisions and aspirations.

The terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001 against America brought many to their knees in church pews and temples plus mosques because of the fears of continued moments of horror. The military metaphor would be "there is no such thing as an atheist in a foxhole." The "Great Depression" commencing in 1929 had those same religious impacts, as the masses begged for help and grace from Almighty God. Sometimes the metamorphosis (transformation) is because of personal setbacks involving relationships, health, finances, or confusion. If someone, as a common example, is diagnosed with a fatal illness earthy attachments lose their hold while thoughts of divinity and the afterlife quickly settle inwards.

The communal dimensions cited above should also have that impact as well. When the hurricane season of late August wrecked havoc in the Caribbean, including Cuba (just a few weeks after visiting that communist country), our news alerts reminded us all that the United States was on that same radar screen. First came Texas, before a major earthquake in Mexico. In North Korea, nuclear bomb tests were shaking planet earth. Any connections? Then much of Florida the second weekend of September was rocked. One particular area hit hard, with waves up to ten feet, was Key West. Back in March when I was there, six months previously, those streets were lined with business activity and cultural engagement. I prayed in a beautiful church that could have passed as either Catholic or Episcopal. One would think the looming storms would shake everybody out of spiritual complacency or lethargy. One young man of 27, in the South Beach area of Miami-Dade County, thought otherwise. He planned to get "wasted" as the hurricane struck. "We have vodka, beer, rum, whiskey, champagne for the ladies. We are going to get completely drunk, five guys and four girls - you never know what will happen." One thing I do know. These individuals need a deep reality check, and were I married with children they would not be the friends I would wish for them.

Another reality we Catholics, trying to be faithful, must accept is the changing dynamics of Catholicism throughout the world and in particular within the Archdiocese of New York. When a group of priests and deacons gathered on September 7 at the Catholic Charities offices in Middletown, I was struck by some raw numbers a few of the other pastors were citing. At one parish, a typical weekly collection was \$1800 average with perhaps a total of 140 combined attending the weekend Masses. At another the numbers were slightly better, with \$3000 collected and 170 attending. Considering declining numbers of priests, attendees, and collections projected over the next decade will these parishes and many others still be around in 2027? In 2022?

When I did a wedding rehearsal on September 8 at a former assignment, Annunciation in the Crestwood section of Yonkers, I took note of their numbers the previous weekend combined with the merged-in Our Lady of Fatima. Attendance at both parishes counted was 1,090 and a collection of \$14,930. Mind you, a very affluent area of Westchester County with many generous parishioners. That same Labor Day weekend for Saint Francis of Assisi/Sacred Heart: combined attendance of 1,049 and a collection of \$13,269. The City of Newburgh is in a very different economic category from the Westchester numbers cited above, bordering on Scarsdale. My point is you are incredibly generous parishioners, helping me and the other priests and staff to provide the sacraments and message of Jesus and His Church to you in a promising future. With the immigrant base surrounding our two parishes, and a belief that we will continue to attract new parishioners, we will serve you in good times as well as bad. God bless Saint Francis of Assisi and Sacred Heart.

FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

First Reading: Isaiah 63:16b-17, 19b, 64:2-7

In this straightforward psalm, the people acknowledge their sinful ways, yet plead that their Creator might reveal himself to them. They ask God to remember, not their sins, but that "We are all the work of your hands."

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:3-9

Paul explains to the Corinthians that they are specially favored by God who has sent his only Son to them. He reminds us all that it was through God's grace that we have been called to kinship with Christ.

Gospel: Mark 13:33-37

Just as a servant watching over the master's house does not know when he will return, we do not know the hour of the Second Coming. Mark reminds us of the warning from Jesus to always be on guard, for we know not the day nor the hour.
