December 10, 2017
Second Sunday of Advent

Henry David Thoreau wrote in 1849, in an essay entitled "A Week on the Concord and Merrimack Rivers", this observation about the past: "Most events recorded in history are more remarkable than important, like eclipses of the sun and moon, by which all are attracted, but whose effects no one takes the trouble to calculate. " Thoreau was born on July 12, 1817 in Concord, Massachusetts and died in the same setting on May 6, 1862. He was only forty-four, but his words as an essayist and philosopher live on, despite his melancholy viewpoint about the deep-rooted effects of historical moments. A Harvard graduate in 1837 Thoreau shunned the typical professions for a college graduate of his time: law, medicine, business, or the church. Aimless, he went to work in 1841 in the pencil business of his family. **Four years later** on July 4, 1845 he moved to a small house on Walden Pond, to live simply for two years. He wrote in *Walden*, words that still echo through history 172 years later: "I went to the woods because I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not, when I came to die, discover that I had not lived. I did not wish to live what was not life, living is so dear; nor did I wish to practice resignation, unless it was quite necessary. I wanted to live deep and suck out all the marrow of life, to live so sturdily and Spartan-like as to put to rout all that was not life... " Thoreau planted words in future generations of readers, stirred by a similar call to make a lasting impact in this world. Though he was not a devotee of organized religion, his integral humanism can merge at points with the world of faith.

Trees planted in parks also leave their marks on the history of a park, a place of memories and emotions. I have deeply imbedded recall of innocent days in Bogota, New Jersey in the late 1960's at Beechwood Park playing baseball, football, and basketball. Whenever I pass my childhood recreational field the trees that were there then resonate with me today nearly five decades later. In recent months I have noticed the passing of many trees at Downing Park in the City of Newburgh, first opened to the public in 1897. Trees die like flowers, humans, pets, and many ideas do. Parishes also face the same wrecking ball of destiny when populations of faith move, stagnate, die, retire, or become indifferent to the social norms of the current age they are challenged by.

The heavy process of merging and closing parishes of any denomination have escalated in recent decades. Europe began this decline three decades ago, reduced to low single digits of Mass attendance numbers and churches closing only to be reopened as bar lounges and flying circus schools in some cases. Developing moments in time will dictate their future relevance and survival. The United States now has caught up to those European numbers of the 1980's, devoid of many young people that once filled their school playgrounds and wooded surroundings. A few years ago I spent a few days at a scenic sea coast setting in Maine, far removed from the burdens and stresses of priestly ministry that the diocese had me running in another parish before coming back home to Newburgh. I understood well at that point what Thoreau was looking for seventeen decades earlier. Later I would become aware of seven parishes merged in the Portland Diocese, because of the same priestly number and parishioners attendance in church declines that are now plaguing the Archdiocese of New York. All Saints Parish ("A Roman Catholic faith community on the coast of Maine") was comprised of Our Lady Queen of Peace in Boothbay Harbor, Saint Ambrose in Richmond, Saint Charles Borromeo in Brunswick, Saint John the Baptist also in Brunswick, Saint Katharine Drexel in Harpswell, Saint Mary in Bath, and Saint Patrick in Newcastle. The regional school for the seven parishes is Saint John's in Brunswick.

They shared the same small group of part-time employees, faith formation and musical ministry efforts, confession schedules, combined income (for June 18, 2017 the total collection was \$23,996 (which averages \$3, 428 per parish), choir rehearsals, pilgrimage trip to the Holy Land (which our parishes are heading to in just a few weeks), statue dedications, material collections for those less fortunate, educational classes, pastor reflections in bulletins, baptism formation sessions, news of both the community plus the diocese, marriage name announcements, Knights of Columbus activities, notifications of staff names, and advertisements that mark a typical bulletin in any New York parish.

Be it Maine or New York we share the same challenges, concerns, blessings, and graces within the life moments God has us all here together. Our collective fates are in His divine hands and the human forces running His parishes. May we choose wisely.

THE STORY OF OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE Feast Day – December 12th

In 1531 the Aztec's in Mexico were practicing human sacrifice to such a degree that the bishop wrote that if God Himself did not intervene with a miracle, the entire continent would be lost. To this desperate plea, God responded not with military force, but by sending His mother with the transforming power of maternal love. Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared to St. Juan Diego, a humble peasant man, leaving her image on his tilma. In the ten years following the apparition, the brutal, pagan practices ceased, and over ten million people were baptized and converted to Christ. Her miraculous image hangs in the Basilica in Mexico City and is visited by more than six million pilgrims a year.

TODAY
SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

First Reading: Isaiah 40:1-5, 9-11

Isaiah emphasizes that from the desert to the mountains, all people must prepare for "the glory of the Lord to be revealed." Rather than looking only at God's power, Isaiah focuses on God's kindness, comparing it to a shepherd who feeds and cares for his flock.

Second Reading: 2 Peter 3:8-14

For those who are impatient for the Second Coming, Peter explains that time is different to God than to people. He reminds them that they should be grateful for the extra time to prepare, and concentrate on striving to become all that God would want them to be.

Gospel: Mark 1:1-8

In this passage, John the Baptist stressed the importance of the coming of the Messiah. He acknowledged that he was only the messenger, and unfit to "stoop and untie his sandal straps." John urged them to prepare for one far holier than he, who would walk among them.
