

January 28, 2018 Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Benjamin Franklin (1706-1790) took to his burial place at Christ Church in Philadelphia many witty remarks. One such nugget of wisdom was: "There are three things extremely hard: steel, a diamond, and to know one's self." From poet Najwa Zebian: "These mountains that you are carrying, you were only supposed to climb." Famed comedian Joey Adams: "Do not worry about avoiding temptation. As you grow older it will avoid you." Saints in the annals of Catholic history also have contributed profoundly toward the discourse of wisdom and spirituality. Saint Ignatius of Antioch (martyred by Emperor Trajan in 107 AD) spoke futuristically with these sentiments, spoken gracefully under pressure and threats. "No earthly pleasures, no kingdoms of this world can benefit me in any way. I prefer death in Christ Jesus to power over the farthest limits of the earth... I no longer take pleasure in perishable food or in the delights of this world. I want only God's bread." From the Jesuit priest martyr Saint John De Brebeuf (massacred on the grounds of Auriesville, New York during the day of March 16, 1648): " My God, it grieves me greatly that you are not known, that in this savage wilderness all have not been converted to you, that sin has not been driven from it. My God, even if all the brutal tortures which prisoners in this region must endure should fall on me, I offer myself most willingly to them and I alone shall suffer them all." During my retreats of 1994 and 1995, I went to those sacred grounds of Auriesville, using my imagination and faith to go back nearly 350 years when these works of religious devotion and courage were exemplified. How much this heroism is required for our tense times.

Northvale, New Jersey is located in the Bergen County sector of the Garden State. On October 16, I went to a quaint bookstore to attend a brief lecture and book-signing of "Fox and Friends" co-host Ainsley Earhardt. She has written two inspirational slim books about the wide-eyed innocence of little children. Under the titles "Through Your Eyes" and "Take Heart My Child", this cable television news journalist offered a combination to the listeners of her country upbringing in South Carolina plus her deep Christian faith to the presentation. Her words also reflected a deep respect for our country, its flag, and the political institutions taking on the arduous task of navigating America through the turbulent waters of modern world history. Raised by parents that demanded weekly church attendance and work outside of schooling at a young age, Ainsley was quite clear that she has sought the help of God in her career aspirations with such diligence that should those career choices interfere with that faith she would renounce that fame and fortune. She praised the work of every person, including a sister that is a teacher and a brother in sales departments. When I had the chance to approach this female mountain of faith, she engaged me in conversation for nearly ten minutes. I spoke of my vocation as a priest to her, life as a baby beginning in an orphanage, and the challenges of running two parishes in a gritty part of the City of Newburgh. In my autographed books Ainsley wrote to me: "Father Bill, you are so special. God clearly had a big plan for your life. Thank you for sharing Christ's love. Love, Ainsley."

The thoughts on speciality, big life plans, and bringing His love to others is not just my calling but that of all parishioners. In a world of explosive political theater, glee with destructive gossip to fill the scandal pages of tabloids alongside mass media, storms that destroy large properties of Cuba to Puerto Rico and Florida through Texas, forest fires engulfing Northern California including the Santa Clara home of famed "Peanuts" artist Charles Schulz, a dictator 6000 miles away from the United States continuously threatening to destroy America, technology increasingly displacing the economic livelihoods of many, sudden medical diagnosis that could upend any of our lives without warning, and the raw brutality of human interaction such faith of media persona like Ainsley is refreshing to observe in action. To not be embarrassed by our faith, but to be animated by it in thought and action is the grace offered to us by this very Jesus we purport to follow, warts and sins as well. Seeking His mercy and love is what we are about. Father Bill
