

April 15, 2018 Third Sunday of Lent

Alexander Graham Bell was born on March 3, 1847 at 16 South Charlotte Street in Edinburgh, Scotland. His father Alexander (1819-1905) was a teacher of speech and phonetics, while his mother Eliza Grace (1809-1897) was a painter and musician though felled by her loss of hearing starting at the age of twelve. The backgrounds of his parents would greatly influence his vocational choices to help the world through diverse ways of communication. At colleges in Scotland and England, Alexander discovered a fascination in the study of vowel sounds and linguistic language instruction. Bell came to Boston on April 1, 1871 to teach deaf children at the Clarke School in Northampton, Massachusetts. Two years later he taught vocal physiology in the School of Oratory at Boston University. He began harmonic telegraph experiments also in 1873, out of which he developed the technology for a transmitter patent on March 7 of 1876. Three days later Thomas Watson cried out: "Dr. Bell, I heard every word you said - distinctly."

Over the next year in the Boston area became the birth of the telephone as conversations began over outdoor telegraph wires, a long distance call occurred between Boston and Salem sixteen miles away, and the first telephone line was built on April 4 of 1877. Bell became an American citizen in 1882, while the Bell Telephone Company provided most of the phone service in Canada and the United States from 1877-1984 (when the Justice Department during the term of President Ronald Reagan broke the Bell System into independent companies). The founder of the telephone had many wonderful observations about life of note. In 1914, at the Friends School in Washington D.C.: "Don't keep forever on the public road, going only where others have gone. Leave the beaten track occasionally and dive into the woods. You will be certain to find something that you have never seen before. Of course, it will be a little thing, but do not ignore it. Follow it up, explore all around it: one discovery will lead to another, and before you know it you will have something worth thinking about to occupy your mind. All really big discoveries are the results of thought."

Another reflection from Alexander Graham Bell, undated, goes like this: "People generally attribute to other people the same kind of motives they experience themselves. We are all of us inclined to believe that other people are actuated by the same motives that actuate us. The people who think the whole world is bad are generally bad at heart themselves. The pure - good - honest heart is ever ready to believe that other people are actuated by right motives. Even though we may not understand the motives of others, it is always best to attribute right motives and think no evil - for evil thought harms us as well as those of whom we think it."

Bell died on August 2, 1922 in the Cape Breton sector of Nova Scotia, Canada. On August 4, the feast day of Saint John Vianney of France, his burial services were conducted at his estate on Beinn Bhreagh Mountain. Newspaper accounts reported that "every phone on the continent of North America was silenced for two minutes in honor of the man who had given mankind the means for direct communication at a distance."

A spiritual key for each of us is to connect the dots of our life in conjunction with an overall relationship with God. That means using as connecting points all of the persons, places, things, memories, explorations, travels, experiences, education, losses, blessings, sacraments, Masses, instructions, seminars, courses, prayers, and ponderous looks at the sky for inspiration into His holy path. I worked for New Jersey Bell Telephone from 1978-1988, and remember well the day I applied for a job during my senior year in high school at the Hackensack (New Jersey) employment office now closed. There was also so many wonderful co-workers, a Disneyland experience in 1979 with my California cousins in Anaheim for a behind-the-scenes exhibit exploration led by Pacific Telephone employees, and the teary final day when I left Bell Atlantic on January 9 of 1988 for the seminary system. That piece of my past history contributes largely to what I am today. May each of us see life from that vantage point, whereby the separated pieces of life merge as one (warts and all) to foster the plan of God for one and all.

FOR THOSE SUFFERING THE LOSS OF A LOVED ONE


